Context

During the week of 5–9 September, FIND will bring together leaders, experts, and advocates to explore the multiple facets of diagnostics for non-communicable diseases (NCDs) in low- and middle-income countries (LMICs). We will release four coffee conversation videos (5–8 September), and organize a live webinar discussion on 9 September, followed by a **Twitter chat**.

What is a Twitter chat

A Twitter chat is a moderated public conversation on Twitter. It is an opportunity for Twitter users (individuals and organizations) to engage with other users on a specific topic.

In our case, we will reflect on the week's topic: **the role of diagnostics for NCDs**. It will be an opportunity for the NCDs, diagnostics, and broader global health communities to share thoughts and reflections on the content released during the week, and to interact with some of the speakers.

How it works and how to participate

FIND will host the Twitter chat and will post five questions on its <u>Twitter channel</u>, at 5-minute intervals. The questions will start with "Q" + the number of the question (for example: Q1, Q2, ...) and will include the event's hashtag: <u>#NCDsDiagnostics</u>.

To participate:

• In Twitter, search for the event's hashtag (<u>#NCDsDiagnostics</u>) and select "Latest"

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• Post your answer to the questions as a new tweet, starting your post with "A" + the number of the question, and including the event's hashtag (<u>#NCDsDiagnostics</u>) (for example: A1: ...)



- Interact with other users, by retweeting, liking, commenting, etc.
- Always include the event's hashtag (<u>#NCDsDiagnostics</u>) in your tweets, to ensure that other users see them.



Draft questions

Please note that we may slightly edit these questions based on the content shared during the week of events. The main themes, however, will remain the same.

- **Q1:** Throughout the week, we have touched upon the many aspects of diagnostics for NCDs: from innovation to financing, to integrated approaches, and global targets. What is your key takeaway? What message has resonated with you the most?
- Q2: @MikkelsenBente_, @Bashier10, and @drsergiocarmona mentioned this week that access to diagnostics & self-monitoring tools is crucial to achieving the global targets for NCDs. How can we increase access around the OOO?
- Q3: There are still many market barriers to diagnostic innovation in low- and middle-income countries, as @JamesWHazel and @sanjayssarin mentioned this week. What are the hardest to overcome in your opinion? And as our speakers are you seeing any improvements?
- **Q4:** What shifts are needed to ensure more integrated, patient-centric care for people with NCDs? This week, @fifarahman & @Ldruskic mentioned: more healthcare professionals trained, less stigma, lower prices, & more advocacy. What would you add?
- **Q5:** Long-term financing mechanisms for NCD diagnostics, monitoring, and care, need to be locally owned, based on national priorities and contexts, said our speakers @Karaghanson and @BillRodriguezID this week. Do you agree? Why?
